Substance Use research training program for Physician Researchers in Emergency Medicine (SUPR-EM)

The Substance Use research training program for Physician Researchers in Emergency Medicine (SUPR-EM) is an early career research training program at Northwestern University which aims to enrich research training for emergency medicine residents.

Program Description

For the selected scholars, we seek to strengthen their commitment to an academic career in research that is aligned with the strategic plan of NIDA. SUPR-EM training will be focused on three pillars: 1) core didactic curriculum; 2) experiential research training; and 3) professional development. Multiple mentors from emergency medicine and other departments will support each trainee.

The SUPR-EM core curriculum will include workshops and seminars in research methods, substance use topics, and best practices and ethics in research. Scholars will design and execute independent research projects supported by their expert mentors as they prepare for research independence. This program may be of interest not only to those planning to pursue research fellowship, but also individuals interested in Toxicology, Addiction Medicine, Pain Medicine, Palliative Care and Social Emergency Medicine.


Eligibility
